#### Wildlife Crime in Scotland - 2014 Annual Report

#### **Background**

- Section 20 of the Wildlife and Natural Environment (Scotland) Act<sup>1</sup>, passed by the Scottish Parliament in 2011, introduced a requirement into the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981<sup>2</sup> that Scottish Ministers must, after the end of each calendar year, lay before the Scottish Parliament a report on offences relating to wildlife.
- The third of these reports, the Wildlife Crime in Scotland 2014 Annual Report<sup>3</sup> was published by the Scottish Government on 30 September 2015, accompanied by a press release4.
- 3. At its meeting on 2 November 2015<sup>5</sup>, the Rural Affairs, Climate Change and Environment (RACCE) Committee agreed<sup>6</sup> to hold a formal evidence session with Police Scotland and the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS). The Committee took evidence from these organisations during its consideration of the Wildlife Crime in Scotland - 2013 Annual Report on 29 October 2014<sup>7</sup>, and agreed to take evidence from them again on the most recent report.
- 4. In 2014, the Committee also took evidence from the Minister for Environment and Climate Change, Paul Wheelhouse<sup>8</sup>. This year, the Committee has agreed to write to the Minister for Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform, Dr. Aileen McLeod, following the evidence session with Police Scotland and COPFS.

## Wildlife Crime in Scotland - 2014 Annual Report

The report covers the calendar year 2014, using data for the 2013-14 financial year. This shift in focus is a response to the RACCE Committee's comments9 on previous reports on the inhibitors to analysis presented by the provision of information referring to different time periods. In the Introduction and Appendix 2 of

the Report<sup>10</sup>, the Scottish Government has described how it was not possible to provide crime and court proceeding statistics in a calendar year format and how all other data has been presented on a financial year basis for consistency.

- 6. The report contains the following chapters:
  - Headline Trends containing information on crimes recorded by Police Scotland, crimes reported to the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS), criminal proceeding statistics, people with a charge of wildlife crime proved and penalties applied;
  - Additional Data Sources outlining information from sources such as Science and Advice for Scottish Agriculture (SASA), SAC Consulting, Scottish Natural Heritage and the Scottish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SSPCA);
  - Wildlife Crime Priority areas these are identified as:
    - i. Badger persecution
    - ii. Bat persecution
    - iii. Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES)
    - iv. Freshwater Pearl Mussels
    - v. Poaching (including deer poaching, hare coursing and fish poaching)
    - vi. Raptor persecution

This chapter also contains information on fox hunting and the Protection of Wild Mammals (Scotland) Act 2002, following increased interest in this subject during the summer of 2015. The Minister undertook to include information on breaches of the 2002 Act in correspondence to the Committee on 1 September 2015<sup>11</sup>;

- PAW Scotland an update on the work of the Partnership for Action Against Wildlife Crime (PAW) Scotland<sup>12</sup>;
- Police Scotland Details on the work of Police Scotland throughout 2014;

- Legislative Changes Information on the Environmental Protection (Restriction on the Use of Lead Shot) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2013 which temporarily allowed the use of lead shot at Barry Buddon during the Commonwealth Games;
- Priority Work for 2015 Includes information on the anticipated outcome of the Wildlife Crime Penalties Review Group<sup>13</sup> (subsequently published in November 2015<sup>14</sup>).

#### Other information

In November 2015, the Wildlife Crime Penalties Review Group published its report<sup>15</sup> on whether the penalties for wildlife crimes were adequate and a deterrent.

In February 2015 Scottish Environment Link published a report entitled Natural Injustice<sup>16</sup> which was a review of the way four types of wildlife crime: persecution of badgers, bats, freshwater pearl mussels and raptors, were being investigated. The report tracked the response to 148 cases reported to the Police between 2008 and 2013.
